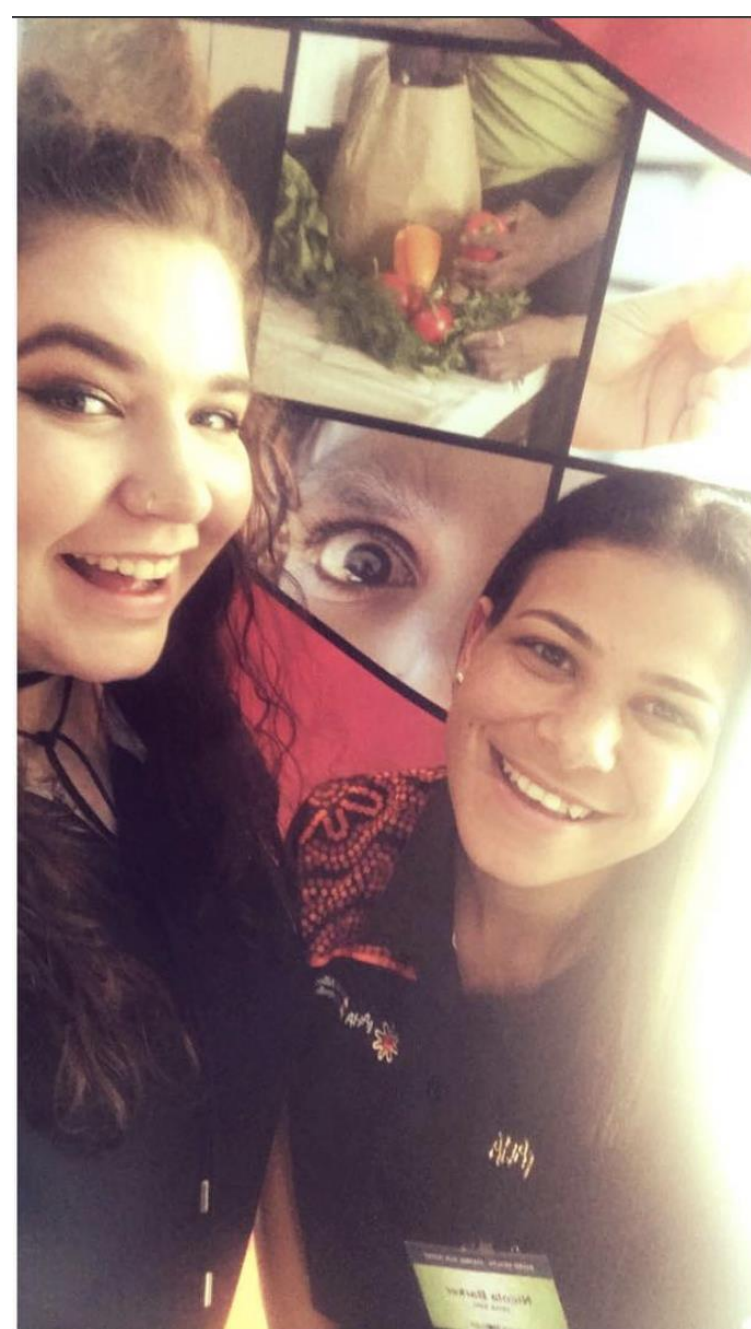


Our IAHA SRC Journey
