Shaun Tatipata, a proud Wuthathi and Ngarrindjeri man, is a trained Aboriginal Health Practitioner based in the Northern Territory. Shaun is the founder of the Deadly Vision Centre, Australia's first Aboriginal-owned optical and eye care provider. Trained in the Northern Territory, Shaun has dedicated over two decades to improving health outcomes for Indigenous Australians.

Through the Deadly Vision Centre, Shaun delivers culturally safe eye care, addressing issues like diabetic retinopathy and cataracts, which disproportionately affect Indigenous communities, as noted in a 2017 Australian Institute of Health and Welfare report.
